SUBJECT SPOTLIGHT: ICT & COMPUTER SCIENCE

The ICT and Computer Science Department offers an engaging and innovative curriculum designed to cultivate students' digital literacy. Students in Key Stage 4 can choose between two exciting options to deepen their knowledge and skills: Cambridge Nationals in IT and GCSE Computer Science.

<u>YR 7</u>

Our Year 7 students have made great strides in their digital learning this year, becoming comfortable with our school's computer systems and Google Suite apps. It's been wonderful to see their progress, from those first tentative logins to now using Google Classroom and other applications with ease. They're currently working on a creative writing project, a "Create Your Own Adventure" story using Google Forms, and will soon be introduced to the fundamentals of hardware, software, and binary.

<u>YR 9</u>

Year 9 IT students have been discovering how key IT theories connect to the real world. They're now diving deeper into Augmented Reality (AR) to get ready for their Year 10 coursework. We'll also be boosting their spreadsheet skills for their other coursework project. **Our Year 9 Computer Science students** have been leveling up their programming skills while learning about how computers represent data (binary, bitmaps, ASCII, and sound). We'll keep building on their programming knowledge through hands-on practice. This summer, they'll explore the inner workings of computers with a unit on hardware and software, including operating systems, the fetch-decodeexecute cycle, and the CPU.

<u>YR 8</u>

Year 8 students have been learning to program in Python, a text-based language that helps build important skills like problem-solving, focus, and resilience. They've discovered that even mistakes are valuable learning experiences. If your child has enjoyed this programming unit, they might be interested in our Computer Science GCSE. They are now working on a mini Augmented Reality project, developing the independent IT skills they'll need for our KS4 ICT coursework.

<u>YR 10</u>

Year 10 have been working on developing their independence through their first live piece of coursework. More details on this will be communicated with you very soon. This is their first piece worth 30% of their final grade and is centred around planning, creating and reviewing an AR prototype app.

Their second piece of coursework will be starting in September which is based around planning, creating and reviewing a spreadsheet scenario. We will be developing their spreadsheet skills in the summer term ready for this assignment. Alongside this we have continued to

develop their theory knowledge and will be revising units they completed in Year 9 ready for the Year 10 exam.

....and a special mention to Ewan H who was awarded a Silver Certificate!





ROTARY CLUB POETRY PRIZE GIVING!





To ensure a smooth and safe drop-off and pick-up process, please utilize the designated drop-off points available on Sika Avenue.



What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

AGE-INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

While TikTok's "Following" feed only displays videos from users someone follows, "For You" is a stream of clips based on their previously watched content. Most videos on a child's "For You" feed will therefore be light-hearted and amusing, but it could potentially surface something unsuitable. TikTok's guidelines prohibit the sharing of lilegal or inappropriate content, but the sheer volume of uploads mean they aren't manually monitored and vetted.

DANGEROUS CHALLENGES

Due to TikTok's Immense popularity, some young people have unfortunately been influenced by videos challenging them to perform harmful, criminal or even deadly acts. One extreme example was the 'blackout' trend, which encouraged users to hold their breath until they passed out from a lack of oxygen. It led to two families filing lawsuits against TikTok over the tragic deaths of their children.

CONTACT WITH STRANGERS

With around 1.1 billion users globally, the potential for contact from strangers on TikTok is high – especially as accounts created by over-t6s (or youngsters using a false date of birth) are sat to public by default. This not only means that someone's profile is visible to everyone else on the app: it also lets their videos be suggested to others and enables anyone to comment on them or download them.

TikTok is a free social media platform that lets users create, share and watch short videos ranging anywhere from 15 seconds to 10 minutes in duration. The app gained notoriety for its viral dances, trends and celebrity cameos and can be a creative, fun platform for teens to enjoy. Now available in 75 languages, it has more than a billion active users worldwide (as of spring 2022) and is most popular with the under-16 age bracket. In fact, a 2022 Ofcom report found TikTok to be the most-used social media platform for posting content, particularly among young people aged 12 to 17.

IN-APP SPENDING

TikTok is free, but users have the option to buy TikTok coins, which can be used to purchase emojis in the app. These emojis are then sent as rewards (retaining their monetary value) to other users for videos they've created. Coin bundles range from £9.99 to an eye-watering £99; TikTok's policy is that they can't be bought by under-18s, but it's possible to bypass this with a fake birthdate.

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ERESTRICT

ADDICTIVE NATURE

TikTok can be addictive, especially for young people: compulsive repeated use can interfere with sieep patterns and be a distraction from other activities. The platform recently introduced default usage time limits of 60 and 100 minutes for new members under 16 (in the UK, children with TikTok average 102 minutes per day on the app), but these restrictions can easily be removed in the settings.

TIKTOK NOW

Introduced in late 2022, the 'TikTok / Now' feature lets users post a daily video or photo at the exact same time as their friends. Users receive a synchronised notification at a random time of day, giving them three minutes to take a video or real-time photo. This addition can not only be a distraction to young people but could lead to them inadvertently sharing private content such as their location.

Advice for Parents & Carers

ENABLE FAMILY PAIRING

DISCUSS THE DANGERS

Family Pairing allows parents to link their TikTok account with their child's and control their settings remotely. Parents can then, for example, turn on Restricted Mode (reducing the chances of a child seeing inappropriate content); set screen time limits; and manage their child's ability to send messages (and to whom). Children can't alter these settings without parental approval.

MAKE ACCOUNTS PRIVATE

Although under-16s will have their TikTok account set to private by default, bypassing this setting is relatively easy. However, parents have the ability to manually set their child's account to private – meaning that their videos won't be visible to strangers and they won't be able to exchange messages with people who aren't on their friends list.

READ THE SIGNS

If you're concerned that your child might be spending too much time on TikTok, or that they've been emotionally affected by something inappropriate or upsetting that they've seen, it's important to know how to spot the possible signs. Increased irritability and a lack of concentration are potential red flags, as are failing to complete homework or regularly not esting meals.
