## SUBJECT SPOTLIGHT: GEOGRAPHY



At Deer Park, we believe that Geography is more than just learning about places; it's about understanding the world and our place in it. Our geographers explore both the local and global, from the Uplands development in Botley to the tropical rainforests of Malaysia.

A local focus helps students appreciate the complexities of their own community and the impact of development on people and the environment. By studying these contrasting locations, students can gain a deeper understanding of the challenges faced by people and their environments.

Our students develop essential skills like problem-solving, data analysis, and spatial awareness. For example, our Year 10 geographers recently analysed satellite imagery to assess the impact of climate change on Arctic sea ice. We challenge our geographers to consider human activities, from climate change to hazard mitigation. By fostering a culture of inquiry and debate, we are encouraging our students to become responsible global citizens.

#### YR 7 CURRENT CURRICULUM

Year 7 geographers are delving into the world of urban development! They're investigating the Uplands development, learning about the local landscape, and honing their map reading skills. As part of this project, they'll explore the different viewpoints of people affected by the development, from local residents to developers. To complete the unit, students will participate in a decision-making exercise, debating the merits of the Uplands project and ultimately forming their own opinions.

#### YR 9 CURRENT CURRICULUM

Year 9 are diving deep into the world of weather hazards. They've been investigating the formation and impact of tropical storms, learning about the three Ps (prediction, protection, and preparation) to reduce their destructive power. Additionally, they've explored the various weather hazards that affect the UK, from storms and floods to heatwaves. To connect these concepts, students are examining how climate change may be altering weather patterns and intensifying these hazards.

#### YR 8 CURRENT CURRICULUM

Year 8 are investigating the complex world of global threats. They've been studying the devastating impact of plastic pollution and climate change on our oceans.

Additionally, they've explored the science behind earthquakes and volcanoes, learning about plate tectonics and the forces that shape our planet. To round out the unit, students will examine the human element of natural disasters, considering why people continue to live in hazardous areas and the strategies that can be employed to reduce risks.

#### YR 10 CURRENT CURRICULUM

Year 10 have been studying the fascinating world of global biomes. They've been investigating the intricate ecosystems of tropical rainforests and the harsh conditions of the Arctic. By studying the adaptations of plants and animals in these environments, students are gaining a deeper understanding of the delicate balance of nature. Additionally, they're exploring the economic and environmental challenges that both biomes present. They have also been looking into how to strike a balance between development and conservation.





#### ARTS UNIVERSITY BOURNEMOUTH DANCE TRIP






To ensure a smooth and safe drop-off and pick-up process, please utilize the designated drop-off points available on Sika Avenue.

Online Safety & Gaming

SWGfL Safe, Secure, Online

Gaming refers to playing electronic games, whether through consoles, computers, tablets, smartphones or other devices. Gaming remains one of the most popular forms of entertainment, attracting a wide range of age groups from all across the world. Gaming is always looking to develop, often improving on graphical features, accessibility and user engagement as years go by.

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Unlike many other forms of media, gaming brings a sense of challenge to the player.
Usually there is a degree of skill involved that players need to develop in order to progress.
Depending on the type of game, it can also offer players a platform where they can be imaginative and explore their own creativity.



Some games have rich storylines and characters that are engaging and memorable. Many players also use it as an opportunity to compete and socialise with other users whether it be in person or online. More often than not though, people game, because it is fun!

#### **Benefits of Gaming**

- Can develop critical and creative skills
- 2 Can bring educational benefit and awareness
- 3 Is available to most audiences and family members
- 1 Is an easy and accessible way to socialise with others

#### **Considerations for Gaming**

- 1 Have awareness of appropriate age restrictions
- Parental awareness around purchasing
- Active discussions around socialising safely
- **1** Reporting harmful or offensive content online

### **Socialising Online**

A staple of gaming is the community that surrounds it. Groups and audiences can gather around a specific game, character of theme to build specific fan bases that can interact with each other. Young people may like to socialise online because:

- It gives them a platform to be with friends outside of school
- There is usually a competitive element at play, which can feel rewarding
- 3 It can build confidence and social skills which may not be attainable physically
- 4 It gives opportunity to young people who have difficulty socialising with friends and others



#### **Reporting and Blocking**

Gaming communities can range from supportive and educational, to toxic and harmful. In some instances, it can even lead towards more radical content being promoted. When faced with something or someone being harmful online, make sure young people know how to:

- Report the player or piece of content
- 2 Mute or block the player
- **3** Manage their privacy settings or communication options
- $oldsymbol{4}$  Speak with a trusted adult for support
